The Senior Sports Tour 2017: Woldies take Edinburgh



n the afternoon of Friday 15th September, 33 Senior hockey and netball squad members boarded a flight to Edinburgh for some top match play and bonding.

On Saturday morning we set off, armed with sticks, shin pads and gum shields (as well as our music speaker), for our first two hockey fixtures against Mary Erskine School. The 1sts kicked proceedings off and, although this was the first time that the complete squad had played together, everyone put in a tremendous work effort. Despite some great defensive work by Natasha Benson and Jessie Lennihan, and excellent attacking from Ellie Bristowe, who seized the ball from under the nose of many an opponent, Mary Erskine, who had the advantage of a season that had begun three weeks before ours, took the honours 6-0. Next, the 2nds took to the pitch. They

also put everything into their game and there were some strong tackles by Joanna Sinnos in defence and great channelling from Penny Gaul in midfield. However, once again Mary Erskine's extra weeks of training were evident as they overcame us to win 5-0.

We didn't let these initial losses dampen the mood as we enjoyed a city tour of Edinburgh, topped off with a hearty lunch in the Old Town. Then it was time for netball. The 2nds played first against Holyrood Netball Club. Once again we had some brilliant and determined play, with Jade Taylor showcasing some lovely interceptions. As with hockey, the early start of the Scottish season proved to be something of an advantage, as our opponents won 53-15.

The final fixture of the day saw the 1sts take on Heriot-Watt University, some of whose players were four or five years older than ours. But we didn't let that intimidate us; if anything

it spurred our players on, especially Grace Flanagan who exhausted body and voice by her fab jumping for rebounds and great communication. The scoreline didn't represent the quality of our team's play.

Tired after this match-rich day, we enjoyed a meal out and a rather spooky ghost tour of the vaults under the city.

Sunday started with hockey fixtures against Grange Hockey Club. There was a special appearance in goal for our 2nds from Eden Kersse (normally an outfield player), who made some good deflections against fierce attacking. Our girls also made some lovely attacking breaks and had good one-on-one play, but alas our Scottish opponents were victorious.

Our 1st team managed to score two goals within the space of one minute, thanks to some great movement between the forwards and midfielders, and gave our opposition a tough match, resulting in a 2-2 draw.



Next on our itinerary was a visit to Edinburgh Castle, where we all marvelled at the phenomenal panoramic view. Then, after a speedy lunch in the city, we set off for our final fixtures of the tour. The 1st netball team's match was an exciting affair, with lots of skill and physicality on display from both teams. Although our opponents' shooting was consistent, our new arrivals in defence, Nia Griffiths and Charlotte Stimson, successfully forced them into silly mistakes. The final score, 23-41, was not representative of the great teamwork we had shown on court.

Our 2nds showed the same ferocity as they had the day before, with some great movement in the circle from Mieke Ford and Freddy Prime and perfectly placed feeding from Impy McNamara. We put up a great fight, but the quality connections in the Scottish team brought them a 28-14 win.
